

Discussion


1. Abe Lincoln said, "Resolve to be honest at all events." He later issued the Emancipation Proclamation which freed over three million people. How did Abe use honesty to bring freedom to the nation?

- 2. Look at how the illustrator painted Abe's face on page 7. How do you think he is feeling at this moment as he sees people being treated so differently on either side of him?
- 3. What character strengths were most important to Abe as he worked to become a lawmaker and then politician? Which of his words or actions demonstrate this?
- 4. The author wrote: "Lincoln reminded Americans that they were one people." How did Abe do this? What ideas did he offer as common ground?
- 5. Why did the author include Abraham Lincoln's own words? Which of his words do you feel most strongly about? Why?

Activities

1. The illustrator, Kadir Nelson, writes about his travels all over the country to visit landmarks from Abraham Lincoln's life. Create a brochure of 3-5 locations mentioned on the "Important Dates" page at the end of the book, writing 1-2 sentences to explain where each location is and why it is an important place from Abraham Lincoln's life.



2. The last page of this book has a quote from Abraham Lincoln that says, "A house divided against itself cannot stand." Create a picture or mural to represent this powerful quote.
